Morocco's spice of life



TINA MORAN cannot wait to return to Marrakech with its stunning mosques, snake-charmers and vibrant markets

WHAT a mesmerising, magical place Marrakech is. I had no idea that in just three hours from grey London you could be immersed in such a colourful, vibrant, sun-soaked city.

To celebrate a birthday and wedding anniversary, my husband Justin and I headed to Marrakech for a four-night trip, with no idea what to expect

What we discovered was a bustling, rapidly expanding city at the heart of which is the glorious walled Medina with

its souks, palaces and riads. Keen to pack in as many experiences as we could, we went from the airport to Riad Zamzam where we were spending our first night and by 10am were taking part in a cookery class.

Zamzam's kitchen staff first led us to the nearby market where we bought fresh vegetables and meat. Back in the rlad's cool inner courtyard we rustled up assorted salads and a traditional chicken tagine

Cookery lesson over, we met up with local guide Brahim for an invaluable tour through the labyrinthine lanes of the Medina. Our two-hour walk took us past magnificently carved mosques, museums and market squares and into the frantic world of the souks

Here, provided you are willing to haggle for every item, you can buy souvenirs from spices and sweets to anterns, leather goods, rugs the miles of shops and stalls is inevitable which is why a guided tour is recommended.

Brahim kept us on a southerly route and after ar hour we came to Djemaa El Fna, the Medina's main square nere snake-charmers perform alongside magicians and

fresh food and drinks. We headed to the rooftop balcony of the Café de France for a bird's-eye view of this extraordinary World Heritage site where tourists and locals come in their thousands to marvel at the entertainments

afternoon our early start from Gatwick was taking its toll so we headed back to Zamzam

for a drink by the indoor pool. Soon it was time to enjoy the food we had prepared that morning and we opted for dinner on the roof terrace with its marvellous views of the city by night.

A good sleep prepared us for our first full day in Marrakech. After breakfast we took a taxi to the south of the Medina to Dar Les Cigognes, an elegant riad where we were spending our next two nights. Cigognes is French for storks and we could see the birds and their giant nests on the walls of the El

Badi Palace opposite.
The morning was spent attempting to find our way, without a guide, through the souks, trying to spot the landmarks Brahim said would help us. We found the main square where we had lunch upstairs at the Alhambra café offering a perfect view of the bustle below.

Later we stumbled across Medersa Ben Youssef school arguably the city's finest building – Musée de Marrakech and the oldest cinema, although our chances of finding

them again were slim.
The test came when we had to get back to the riad by 4pm for a hammam treatment. We

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

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got lost rowed and finally jumped in a taxi which also got lost

Thirty minutes late, we were ready for some pampering. We were scrubbed, showered, oiled and massaged, wiping out memories of our earlier panic.

Nearing the end of our stay, we took an excursion to the Atlas Mountains. There are many trips to choose from depending on time.

We opted for a 90-minute drive to Imlil, a Berber village from where we walked with a local guide for two hours until we reached the impressive Kasbah du Toubkal. Perched above a valley, the Kasbah offers unparalleled views of the mountains.

While we were out of town our bags were transferred from Cigognes to Riad Kaïss, a gem of a place just a brief walk from the main square. So our day ended with dinner in town and a chance to witness the amazing sight of Diemaa El Fna at night; its rows of food stalls filling the air with smoke and delicious smells.

For our final day we visited the Majorelle Gardens, a botanical masterpiece rescued from ruin by fashion designer Yves Saint Laurent, Before our flight we also squeezed in a quick dash around the lavishly decorated Bahia Palace and a peek inside the Dar Si Said museum with its homage to Moroccan crafts and woodwork

We flew out feeling weary yet invigorated by memories of the dynamic, unique city and vowing

to return soon.
